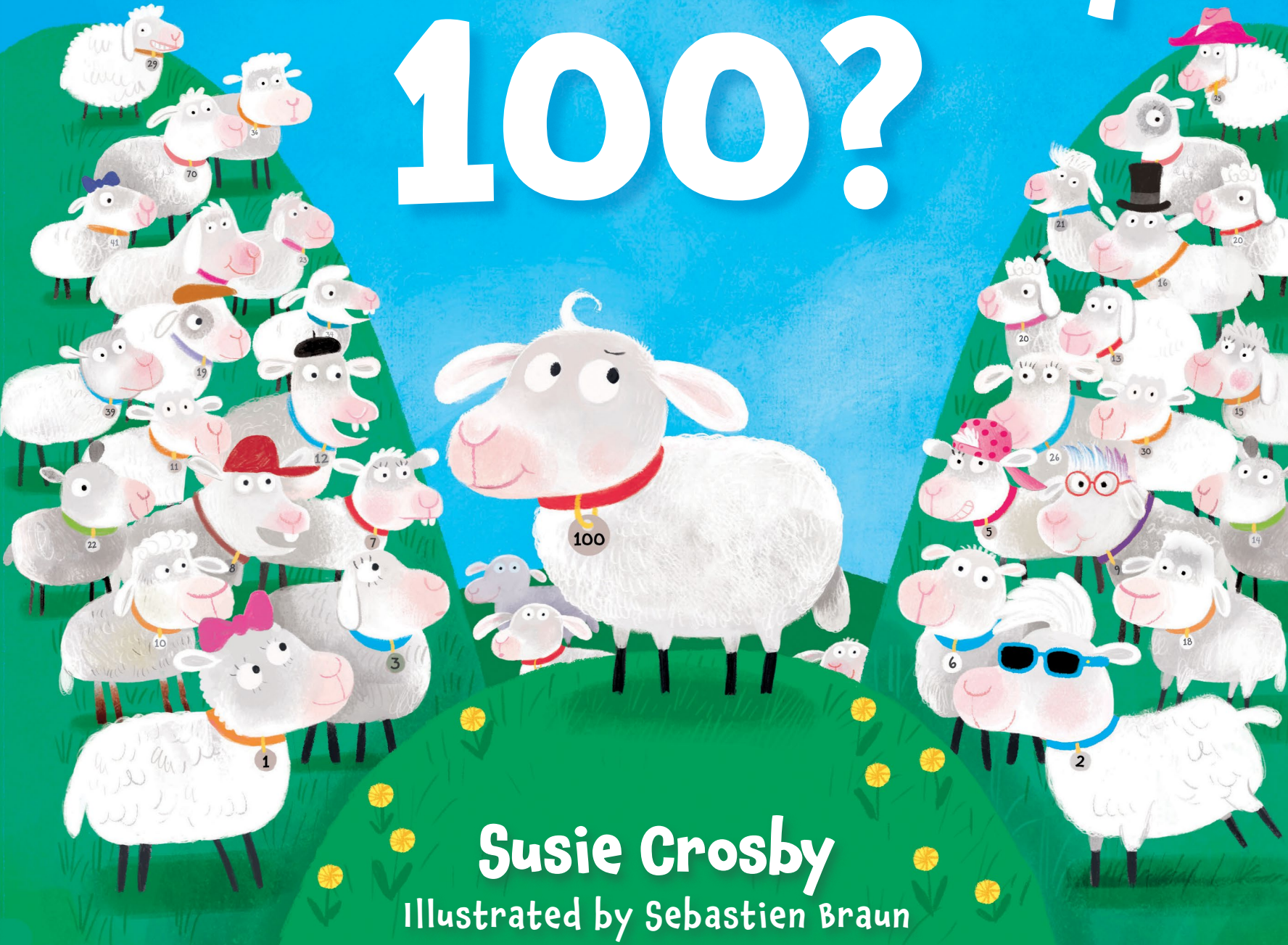

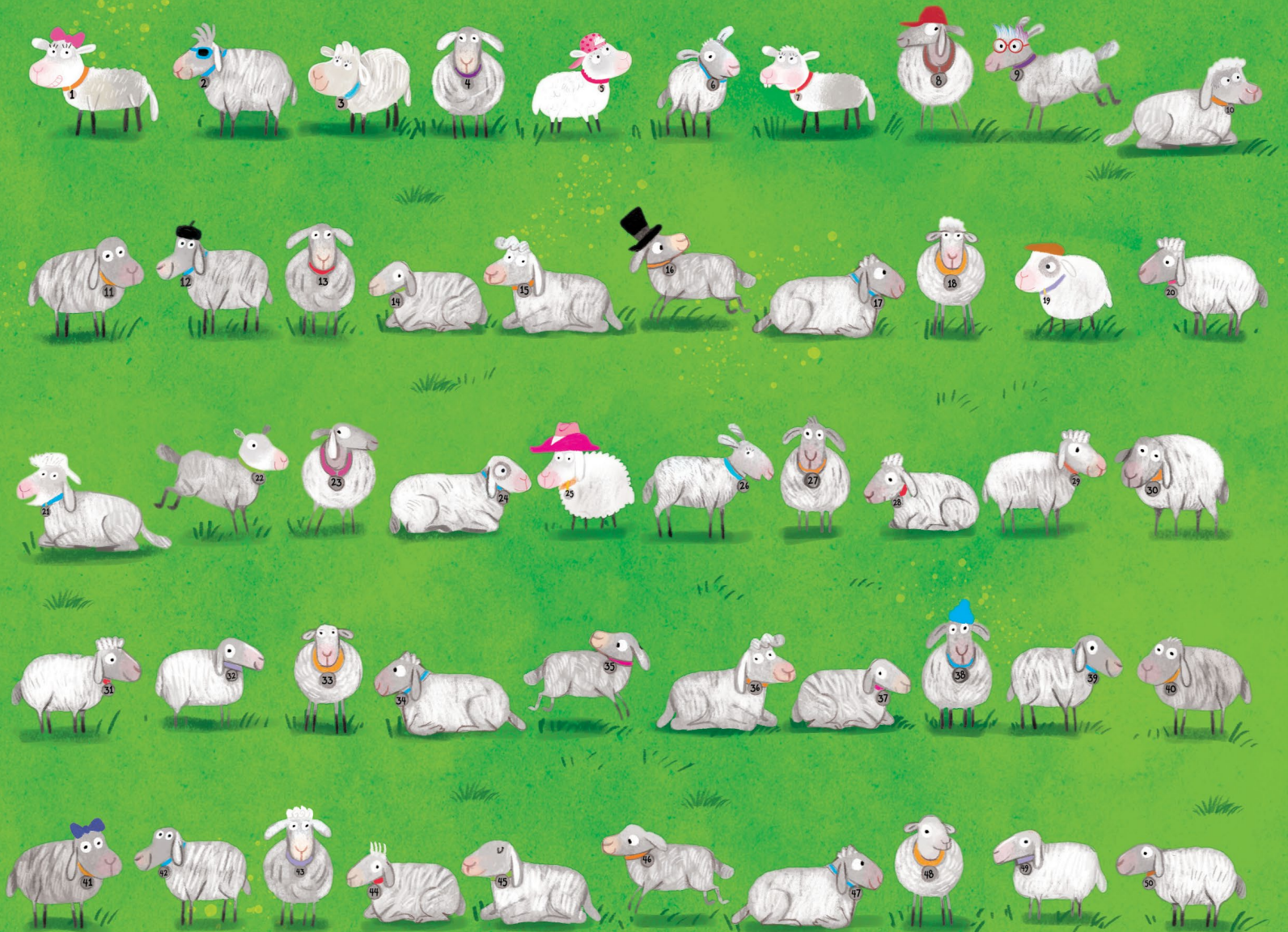
Cobie liked being a sheep.

- Counting challenges and 100 characters to skip count (a key math skill for young learners)
- Discussion questions to better understand Jesus as our Good Shepherd
